

1969 Thesis on M.W. Savage Resurfaces

I would assume the original document lies yellowing in some back room or sub basement deep inside Macalester College. A Xerox copy can be found in the Heritage Room at the Savage Library if you dig deep enough into the archives. However I now know that the carbon copy of the type written original is in the hands of the DPHS as it was received on loan this summer from the family of the author.

In 1969, to fulfill the requirements of his master's degree in education, Linton Kjera Levin wrote his thesis on Marion W. Savage. He titled it A Man, His Horse, And His Iron Horse. He subtitled it A descriptive Analysis of Marion Willis Savage Pioneer Entrepreneur of Minnesota. Though a mouthful of a title page, describe and analyze is exactly what he does, and he does it well. This 57 page dissertation is a treasure trove for amateur and serious historians alike. It is a gold mine of references, period details, analysis and insight.

References:

Mr. Levin clearly did his homework as he incorporated no less than 15 periodicals from both the horse racing world and the rail industry. Included in the sources is a piece from Readers Digest (1947) and an article from Feeds Illustrated (1952) written by M.W.'s son Harold. Levin also used 6 different newspapers dating back to 1899 including the Minneapolis Star, Tribune, and Journal; The Bloomington Sun and The Northfield News. His research paper also cites seven unpublished sources that include mimeographed material from the Bloomington and Hennepin County Historical Societies. In addition Levin relied on interviews from a former employee of The Masonic Home (formerly Savage's summer mansion called Valley View on the north banks of the Minnesota river), Ben Morlock (historian, collector & City of

Savage Justice of the Peace), and M.W.'s son Harold. For those wanting to learn more, Linton's work provides a comprehensive place to start.

Details & Analysis:

Comparing and contrasting Savage's Minnesota exploits with that of his contemporaries across the country, Levin documents Minnesota's transition from an agrarian society to one of industry and capitalism. Savage personified the new order. Much like Rockefeller and Vanderbilt on the national scene, Savage amassed a fortune and spent it lavishly on his personal real estate holdings. His 2600 Portland Avenue residence was elegantly furnished with stained glass, Vermilion paneling, Tiffany lamps and 2 imported French coach horses housed in the stable. He then outfitted a summer home on Lake Minnetonka, and in 1906 moved to the Valley View mansion with its fluted columns, Italian marble staircases, billiard room, theater and bowling alley.

This showplace overlooked Savage's track and stable which were so elaborate they bore the nick-name Taj Mahal.

In 1902 Savage purchased his beloved pacer Dan Patch and his nephew Merton Harrison promptly authored Dan's autobiography. Levin notes how Anna Sewell's best seller of the 1890's, Black Beauty, paved the way for the popularity and success of Dan Patch. Both were written in the first person of the horse and Merton echoed the style and vocabulary of Black Beauty.

Levin even coins a term for how Savage would negotiate contracts for Dan's appearances based on attendance and then conduct massive media and advertising campaigns. Since Dan endorsed almost every product out there, record turnouts were assured and Savage's cut was extremely lucrative. Levin referred to this whole spectacle as Dan Patch Syndrome.

"For 3000 years sports lovers have thrilled to the spectacle of a horse pulling a vehicle in a race, from chariots in the Olympics to sulkies at the fair."

Insight:

In 1907 Savage announced the construction of a new electric rail line named of course, after Dan Patch. Levin chronicles Savage's dream that never came to fruition. Passenger service began the summer of 1910, with travel from Bloomington to Minneapolis. Customers traveled in style. They looked through stained glass windows, walked on plush carpet, sat in leather seats and rested elbows on inlaid vermilion wood. The line started at 54th and Nicollet then ran south to Richfield, Valley View, across a curious little bridge, past Taj Mahal and all the way to Northfield. In 1915, 15 more miles of track wound through Golden Valley, Edina and Saint Louis Park. Savage's Plan of running rail thru to lowa never materialized as the citizens of Faribault would have nothing to do with it. When Savage died in 1916, so did his dream. The railroad was declared bankrupt in 1917 and purchased a year later. Savage's track however would spur growth along all the cities it lay and service industries like Ford, John Deere and Thermo King.

Very little is known of Savage's political beliefs. The Exposition building was so expansive it hosted the Republican presidential nominating convention in 1892 but that was before Savage purchased the building. It is believed politics left a sour taste in Savage's mouth but he did agree to become a candidate for governor in 1908, losing in the nomination convention when the county delegates met. Levin does not mention party affiliation in Savage's bid for governor but he calls M.W. a Republican (referenced to a *Minneapolis Journal* of 1899), probably of the liberal or progressive persuasion.

Savage also ventured into automobile manufacturing in 1911, naming his vehicle, what else, the Dan Patch. He was one of 16 manufacturers in Minnesota at the time. This operation came to an end when the Ford Motor Company began its assembly operations.

Linton Kjera Levin was born in 1934. After graduating with an MA from Macalester College, he served in the army and enjoyed a career teaching social studies and coaching football at Minneapolis Southwest high school. It is believed he chose his thesis topic on the suggestion of his advisor, who lived not far from the Valley View Masonic Home. Mr. Levin succumbed to prostate cancer in 2006 and is interred at Fort Snelling National Cemetery. He leaves behind many legacies, including a thesis on a pioneer entrepreneur.


